

A New Trail on Floyd Hill

Do you like to walk and hike on trails? Well over the summer Mountain Youth Network and CCMRD are building a trail that loops around the school. The trail will be one mile long and it will be so much more than just a path. There will be an outdoor classroom, a fitness station, a reflection space and different learning stations. The trail around the school is going to create an opportunity for students to get outside and not spend the entire day sitting at a desk. By going outside on the trail it will allow for a more open space to have learning opportunities.

The idea of the trail was developed by Mountain Youth Network and Clear Creek School District to help solve COVID challenges and equity challenges. Some of the barriers the trail addresses according to MYN leaders are: "outdoor activities encouraged, less close quarters in cars...increasing equitable access to hiking trail." The trail's purpose is to help the community to spend more time outdoors and get exercise. Melissa English; one of the CCHS teachers who is involved in this project says, "...people will be

able to learn about the natural surroundings and even some history of the area through the educational areas that are being incorporated in the trail design." Additionally, Hugh Pettitt-Kenney, a senior at Clear Creek High School says, "The trail is supposed to promote outdoor activity for not only the students but for the community as a whole. We are hoping to design it with intermittent information stations that teach people about the environment and how to stay active."

There are many CCHS people and organizations that are already actively involved in the building and planning of the trail including TREK and Eco School. English says, "Clear Creek County Trails is the official entity in charge of designing and building the trail. James Kovaly, supervisor for CCC Trails has been helping every step of the way and he and his crew will help with training and supervision for the actual building phase of the trail construction." Pettitt-Kenney says, "There are quite a few community and school organizations that are getting involved with this with the county trails organization, TeemWorks, Eco School, and obviously TREK providing insight, labor, and resources to help get the project done."

Students from many organizations are helping with the organization, creation, and execution of the trail. English says, "Not only are adult members of the school district, Clear Creek County Trails, Trek and Mountain Youth Network leaders collaborating, but there are student

members of Trek, CCHS Eco School, and other student volunteers involved in the project." Each organization is contributing to the trail in many different ways. Eco School is going to plant wildflowers along the trail, and help with many of the wildlife aspects of the trail. Additionally, TREK and Teemworks are working together to provide student workers. TREK is keeping everything organized and is the main leader of the project. Both TREK and Eco School will be sharing the responsibilities to maintain the trail.

Building of the trail is scheduled to begin July 26, andt any student is welcome to help out. Colorado launches \$5M sweepstakes to persuade people to get a COVID vaccine. Here's how it will work.

Colorado is following in the footsteps of Ohio, where a vaccine drawing helped drive a surge in people getting inoculated against COVID-19 Jesse Paul, The Colorado Sun - 12:56 PM MDT on May 25, 2021

You can gamble on contracting COVID-19 or you can get vaccinated and enter a chance to win \$1 million. Gov. Jared Polis on Tuesday unveiled the Colorado Comeback Cash Vaccine Drive, a coronavirus vaccine sweepstakes program aimed at boosting the state's plateauing inoculation rates, especially in parts of the state where the disease is still raging.

There will be five, \$1 million drawings on consecutive Fridays starting June 4. (The final drawing is on a Wednesday.) There will be one winner each week. People cannot win twice. Polis estimates that there is a 1 in 500,000 chance of winning the sweepstakes. About 2.5 million Coloradans — or about 59% of the state's population — had received a first dose of a COVID-19 vaccine as of Tuesday. "If you have been delaying plans to get vaccinated or are still on the fence, now is the time to swing big. It could transform your life," Polis said. "This is \$1 million, cash in the barrel that you can use today. Buy a new home. Take that vacation. Take six months off. Do whatever you like. One million dollars goes a long way."

Here's how it will work: Everyone who has received at least a first dose of a coronavirus vaccine in Colorado and is a resident will be eligible for the prize. People should receive at least one vaccine dose by June 30 to be entered into the last drawing on July 7, which is a Wednesday. To be entered into the first drawing, people should get vaccinated by June 1. Getting fully vaccinated multiple times would not increase someone's chances of winning.

The drawing will be handled by the Colorado Lottery, and winners will be contacted and asked if their personal health information can be used to award them the prize. State officials know who is inoculated because of the Colorado Immunization Information System. Winners can decline to claim their prize, "but you'd be pretty foolish not to," Polis said.

The program mimics a nearly identical "Vax-a-Million" initiative in Ohio. That state saw a surge in vaccinations after its governor announced a plan to offer five \$1 million drawings for those who have received at least a first dose of COVID-19 vaccine. More than 2.7 million people have signed up for Ohio's vaccine giveaway.

Several other states have tried to replicate Ohio's success, including

New York and Maryland. Colorado consulted with Ohio as it sought to

launch its own vaccine sweepstakes initiative. The Colorado Attorney General's Office also helped the Polis administration form the program.

Colorado's initiative is explicitly not a lottery, because a lottery is something you buy into. It's a sweepstakes — or something you enter into. The award money is coming from the CARES Act, the federal coronavirus stimulus bill passed in March 2020.

"This is money that would have otherwise gone toward advertising and marketing," Polis said. "We feel this compliments some of the advertising and outreach that we're doing and will generate even more interest in the vaccine than if we had simple spent this money on television commercials."

Coloradans must be at least 18 years old at the time they win the sweepstakes to be eligible. The winnings are subject to taxes. Jennifer Anderson, deputy executive director of the Colorado Lottery, said all vaccine providers in the state have to provide information to the Colorado Department of Public Health and Environment on who they've vaccinated, including their phone numbers and addresses. She expressed confidence that anyone who has been inoculated will automatically be entered into the sweepstakes.

A random number will be attached to each vaccinated person through the Colorado Department of Public Health and Environment and the Colorado Lottery will select the winning number. A scholarship program is being set up for Coloradans ages 12 to 17 who are vaccinated.

An estimated 70% to 80% of Coloradans must be vaccinated in order for the state to reach herd immunity.
